"Forces of Nature: How Extreme Weather Impacts our Daily Lives" is a very timely resource which aims to teach students about natural disasters and their impact on their communities. Unfortunately it would appear that natural disasters are becoming a more regular occurrence in our world. Almost every week reports come out of the news of a hurricane, earthquake, mudslide, flood, or other devastating a community somewhere in Canada or the world.

Forces of Nature examines four natural disasters in depth: the Quebec ice storm, Hurricane Juan, the Peterborough flood and the Kelowna fires – examples that took place right here in Canada.

Teachers are encouraged to use this resource as an introduction to the discussion of natural disasters, the impact on communities, prevention strategies and research into mitigating the risks and the impact, and the perception of increased frequency and severity of such extreme weather.
